Matt and his wife enjoy traveling and have visited many places across the U.S. as well as the Caribbean, Mexico, and Europe.

Wayne Bennett:

Wayne Bennett is a dentist by profession (retired in 2014) and has been a professional photographer for the past 25 years, specializing in the area of nature photography.

The Great American Photography Weekends (GAPW), 2010. Bill Fortney in particular, was the spark that ignited his turnaround in photography. He enjoyed an association of about 15 years with GAPW and has had the opportunity to learn from and teach with the best of the best in nature photography, including, John Shaw, Rod Planck, Pat O'Hara, Art Wolfe, Bryan Peterson, and of course Bill Fortney.

After GAPW, Wayne taught photography at Disney Institute in Orlando, FL. He has/continues to shoot stock for Sharpshooters, Corbis, and Alamy Agencies and has been published in a number of publications, including Outdoor Photographer. He continues to teach photography through seminars and workshops. Aside from making presentations at the Orlando Camera Club, he has made presentations at camera clubs in Ormond Beach, Vero Beach, and Melbourne.

A few years ago, Wayne started WMB Productions, a company, which brings the biggest names in photography to the Orlando area for seminars and workshops. He has had photographers such as Bill Fortney, Adam Jones, Bryan Peterson, Rick Sammon, Tony Sweet, RC Concepcion (from NAPP), Tim Grey, Bob Krist and Rob Sheppard (editor of Outdoor Photographer magazine).

Wayne has traveled extensively in the United States and around the world. He has photographed on all continents except Antarctica. Wayne is proud to be a charter member of NANPA (North American Nature

Photographers Association) and the Orlando Camera Club. He was the second President of the OCC. The OCC's image of the year (in its annual competition) is named after Wayne, The Wayne Bennett Award.

Wayne has recently had a specialty filter from Singh-Ray Filters named after him, the Singh-Ray Wayne Bennett Smoky Vision Polarizer. Singh-Ray makes the finest photographic filters in the world. In 2008, nine members of the Orlando Camera club, including Wayne, submitted a portfolio of 20 images (selected from over 350 submitted) to the Natures Best Magazine Windland Smith Rice International Photo Competition and won! There were 85 camera clubs worldwide that submitted portfolios to the competition. A composite of 9 of the images was hanging in the Smithsonian Museum of Natural History in Washington, DC until May 2009. Wayne had an image selected as Highly Honored in the 2009 Natures Best Contest. That image was displayed at the Smithsonian until May

A new product and the brainchild of Wayne and good friend Ken Blye is the PUFFIN PAD. The Puffin Pad has just been introduced to the photo marketplace. It is a light-weight alternative to the bean bag.

Jeffri Moore:

Jeffri has been around art in some form most of her life. In 2008, she renewed her interest in photography and enjoys making images of a wide variety of subjects. She has been a member of the Orlando Camera Club since 2008. Jeffri attended the Judging Academy held by the OCC in 2011 and was a judge at multiple OCC competitions. She has given presentations on Camera Phone Photography to several organizations including the OCC and the St. Augustine Camera Club.

THROUGH MY LENS

Interview with a Competition Judge: Reg Garner

Have you ever wondered why a competition judge scored your image in a certain way? We may feel the photo was judged too harshly, or the judge just didn't "see" all of the work we put into getting the shot. Sometimes it's just easier to blame the judge and not the photographer. This article tries to answer some of the questions about judging and how we can improve our photography by competing and taking an honest look at the critique.

"A good photograph is knowing where to stand." - Ansel Adams

I was lucky enough to be able to interview Reg Garner and soak in some of his thoughts on the judging process. Reg is a professional photographer with a passion for capturing the beauty of nature. He is best known for hislandscapes and nature photography taken along Florida beaches, natural springs, or deep in a swamp. His work is displayed at area hospitals, local offices, and galleries.Reg also enjoys teaching photography at local camera clubs and is frequently a guest speaker on photographing Florida nature. He is a past president of OCC and has judged many of our competitions. Here are some of my questions and his remarks.

One question that seemed obvious to ask first was, what is the first thing you notice about a photograph? Reg was quick to reply that he sees the subject first. He looks for a clear and defined subject, next he looks at the background. One of his pet peeves is the horizonline; itshould be straight, which he explained, has an easy fix in Lightroom. Another area that stands out in an image are hot spots. It is important to see some detail in both light and dark areas. Reg offered a good tip saying that one way to catch mistakes is by looking at the photo upside down, you may spot errors you didn't notice before.

Since Reg is a premier landscape and nature photographer, I asked him if there can be difficulties judging an image that is outside his normal genre. He shared that all judges should look at an entry as an independent work no matter the style. There are basic rules of photography that apply to all photos. Reg feels what is also important is the "Wow factor." He looks for images that inspirehim and stand out from the competition.

Carrying over from the last question, I wanted to know if there were any questions, he asks himself while judging. He said that since he has been judging for some time now, he inherently knows what to look for. Most of all, Reg emphasized, that it is important to have a strong subject, so the eye of the viewer doesn't wander off of the page. Too much clutter can hide the subject and distract the viewer. A strong image will stand out and speak to you.

In some competitions it seems that photographers have trouble with the subject. Reg stressed the importance of education either within the club or independently when there is doubt about a category. Reg mentioned the differences between macro and close up, high key and low key, and the correct balance of black and white as some subjects that give people trouble. He said Google can be a good source of information.

There are many different levels of photographers in competitions, from beginner to professional, so I wanted to know if Reg had ever come across an entry that hadno hope. He revealed that he had, but he tries to make every critique and judging a teaching experience. His goal is to say something he likes about the image, something he dislikes, and how to improve the image. He labeled "Momreplies" as the worst form of a critique. A simple "That's so nice" is not enough. Entrants deserve to an honest assessment of their work.

Reg also wanted new and experienced photograpers to understand that competitions should be viewed as an exercise in learning, not only for themselves but for all who view the judging results. In his final comments Reg wanted to remind us to try something different in our photography or processing, to stick with entering the competitions, to use what we learn to make an image that stands out, and says, "Wow."

Thank you so much, Reg, for taking the time and sharing your experience with all of us at OCC.

Remember, photography is your happy place. Relax. Happy shooting.

7 Things to Know Before Booking Your Photo Tour

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1) Tour or workshop?

These terms are sometimes interchanged, but they're really not the same. A workshop typically focuses on targeted instruction. During a workshop, the leader's job is to teach you specific skills or techniques. A tour, on the other hand, is all about getting images at shot locations. During a tour, the leader's main job is to get you to the right place at the right time. He/she may also offer dedicated instructional time, but it's more likely that he/she teaches individual participants as needed in the field. Pointer: use local workshops to learn techniques before spending thousands of dollars traveling to exotic destinations to take the shots!

2) What's included?

In many instances several tour operators offer the exact same itinerary. That's because, for the most part, we use the same ground agents. In spite of this, you'll find a wide variation in the price. Do a little digging to see if the variation is due to differences in lodging, included meals, or length of stay (also see tip #3). Keep in mind: just because you're paying more may not mean you're getting more!

3) Group size.

The number of folks on a tour – or in a workshop – can have a bearing on the price. You may pay more for a smaller group size, but that might be worth it. A smaller group size gives you better access to the tour leader when/if you need assistance.

4) Insured? Permits?

To lead a photography tour in a National Park or National Wildlife Refuge, a permit is required. And, in order to procure a permit, the government requires proof of insurance. While it may be tough to ascertain if a company (or tour leader) follows the rules with regard to procuring needed permits don't hesitate to ask them for proof that they've done so.

5) <u>Physical requirements.</u>

Determining a tour's physical requirements is especially important if you have mobility issues or specific health problems. Some tours require hikes to shot locations, while others get you to where you need by vehicle. Also consider elevation, slopes, and expected temperatures when deciding which tour to choose.

6) How long at shot locations?

To be able to work a scene or capture keepers of wildlife behavior you need to slow down and take your time. It may be difficult to determine ahead of time how your leader works, but you can ask others who've taken the tour if they felt rushed through shot locations. If staying until you're satisfied with your captures is important to you make sure the leader will allow you the time you need at each shot spot.

7) Availability of the tour leader.

Ask questions – and don't hesitate to do so before you sign up! Don't be shy! A leader who's responsive to your needs before a tour starts is a good sign that he/she will be responsive during the tour. You may even want to give him/her a call and see what kind of vibe you get over the phone. Keep in mind: tour leaders spend a lot of time on the road so they may not be able to get back to you immediately.
